City Council Building Chattanooga, Tennessee June 17, 2008 6:00 p.m.

Chairman Bennett called the meeting of the Chattanooga Council to order with Councilmen Benson, Berz, Gaines, Pierce, Rico, Robinson and Shockley present; Councilman Page was absent due to personal commitment. Special Counsel Mike McMahan, Management Analyst Randy Burns and Council Clerk Carol O'Neal were also present.

## PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE/INVOCATION

Following the Pledge of Allegiance, invocation was given by Special Counsel Mike McMahan.

#### MINUTE APPROVAL

On motion of Councilwoman Robinson, seconded by Councilwoman Gaines, the minutes of the previous meeting were approved as published and signed in open meeting.

# <u>SPECIAL RECOGNITION: "TOGETHER WE CAN"</u> <u>SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS</u>

**Rebecca Smith**, Director of Scholarship with the Community Foundation, presented the 2008 scholarship recipients. She noted that there are 56 students receiving scholarships this year which is the largest class ever in the 10-12 year history of the program. She stated there is an 85 percent retention rate and they are very proud of that; that the scholarship is renewable and quite a few are getting up to \$15,000 while matriculating in college through the "Together We Can" Scholarship program. #### **REZONING**

#### 2008-079: Matt Brown

The applicant was present; there was no opposition.

Karen Rennich, Director of Comprehensive Planning, stated this case was heard last month and was deferred for thirty days so the parties could meet. She stated the request is for C-3 for the Salvation Army and Mr. Haynes clarified in the last meeting when this was heard that the request is to address setbacks and the use proposed could be in the current zone. She stated the request for C-3 is to be able to build closer to the street and the recommendation from Planning is for approval with two conditions – the normal C-3 conditions which address setback and also leaving the area undeveloped. She stated this was the point for last month's opposition and the applicant has met with the community members, including Dr. Richard Brown from UTC, and the M. L. King Neighborhood Association Board. She stated they have come up with a list of revised conditions with the intent of clarifying Planning's recommendations in an effort to address some of the citizens' concerns.

Ms. Rennich stated in the applicant's meeting with the neighborhood the following was agreed: zoning of the parcel to C-3 with a special requirement that the buildable area along Eighth Street can be used for residential use, a 15 foot landscape buffer be required for new buildings along Eighth Street and Palmetto Street, and architectural features such as porches, entrances, columns, piers, awnings, bay windows and other projections which add neighborhood-friendly character to the main building mass may project into the 15 foot buffer".

Matt Brown with Franklin Associates Architects was present representing the Salvation Army on this request. He stated that they met with the community members after the issue was tabled for 30 days to help answer any questions or concerns the community or UTC had. He stated they had a very positive meeting and, in fact, the 15 foot buffer was suggested by Dr. Brown at UTC. He stated this is something they do in that area with their campus buildings to get closer to the street for a more residential neighborhood "feel" and there is still enough space for landscaping and beautification of local streets. He stated one thing he wanted to make sure of is that some of the architectural features and entrances mentioned would be allowed to project to help enhance the character of the facility; that there has been a lot of concern about having the building in the neighborhood. He stated the Salvation Army wants to be a good neighbor and build the best building for the money; that they want to make sure the community is satisfied and have the ability to operate a building that will be an amenity to the community. He stated that is the gist of it; that the meeting was very positive and was followed up with transcribed minutes.

#### **REZONING (Continued)**

Dr. Richard Brown, Vice Chancellor of Finance and Operations at UTC, thanked the Council for recommending the 30 day moratorium so the community and concerned persons could talk about the development; that it was the right thing to do. He stated there was good conversation with the Salvation Army, the community and UTC; that there is better understanding and all are more positive about their moving forward. He stated the setback requirement brings a much more attractive project to the community; that everyone was concerned about the prison program and all have a better comfort level. He stated UTC is very supportive in terms of moving it forward and the conversation engaged in broader community concerns for a better community in the next eighteen months.

Councilman Pierce stated that he is glad to hear the University and community met on this project as he was still "left in the dark" and was just approached about it a few months ago. He stated that he made his position known that he could not support enhancing a regional prison in the downtown area and can not go against the grain of both the community and the University. He stated he is happy to know both are in accord.

He stated that it was his thought Mrs. Madison was to come back with ground rules and regulations that would give some governance to this so the Council could remove the perception/appearance of exploitation of any vendors or any of our potential vendors. He stated he would like it if we get into this that any city department that gets involved not be permitted to sell to either vendors or to their potential vendors, which would remove us from the perception of any exploitation.

Chairman Bennett stated Mrs. Madison is out of the city this week and this is on her scope of work once she returns. She asked if the Council would like to move on this now or prefer to defer.

Councilman Benson stated he could not vote for it at this time.

Councilwoman Gaines stated that we do have a representative from Mrs. Madison's office, as well as Mr. (Dan) Johnson.

Chairman Bennett stated that nothing was prepared this morning at the agenda meeting.

Councilman Pierce stated he is not in a position to vote on this as he has talked to several officers who are not really supportive of the way we are going about this; that this will be the first time this has happened in a number of years coming from the police department.

Councilman Pierce stated there are several organizations within the police department – the Fraternal Order of Police, the National Black Police Officers Association and the union; that all of those entities are in a position to go out and solicit funds and it would not be in the name of the city and would just be the organizations within the police department. He stated what he would like to see would be these organizations collectively come together and put on this ball or what have you without this Council sanctioning something that has not been done in the past, to go out and solicit money from the public. He stated it looks as if it is pressure from the department and inquired as to how funds raised would be administered and accounted for, whether they will pass through the treasurer's office or if the police department would handle the funds themselves. He stated for those reasons he is not going to be able to support it at this time.

Dan Johnson stated since Mrs. Madison is out he would prefer to defer the matter a couple weeks to give her time to get those groups together Councilman Pierce referenced to come up with a policy on how to handle this.
