October 11, 2016 6:00 PM

CALL TO ORDER

 other groups that have shown progress for impacting youth. Councilman Smith asked
 Councilman Henderson to clarify the item that he had seconded. Councilman Anderson
 called a *point of order*, stating that there is only one valid motion on the floor. Councilman
 Smith concurred.
- Vice Chair Mitchell requested a roll call vote.
- Councilman Anderson informed the Council of the dates of service and the city's balance being due at the end of the month.
- Councilman Grohn informed the Council that he had not received the financial documents that he had requested regarding this contract.
- Councilwoman Berz requested an itemized statement, to which David Carmody, Deputy Chief Operating Officer, stated that he would check. Councilwoman Berz asked the Council if the item should be deferred until the financial document could be produced.
- Councilman Anderson confirmed with Mr. Carmody that the City owes money to the vendor for continuation of services until the end of this month.
- Councilman Smith questioned Mr. Carmody about why the contract did not come back before the Council for financial approval until now.

Councilman Hakeem commented on the track record of Father to the Fatherless (F2F).
 Councilman Hakeem also commented on judging the success of F2F.

- Councilman Grohn commented on accountability for the organization. He also commented on open requests regarding the Violence Reduction Initiative that were unfulfilled, to which Chief Fletcher responded.
- Councilman Henderson questioned Mr. Carmody about how the funds will be allocated.
 Mr. Carmody agreed to provide the allocations to Councilman Henderson.
- Councilman Henderson also questioned April Boozer and Ace Stafford of F2F about the type of training that mentors will receive. He also asked Ms. Boozer to look into developing a code of ethics agreement for program mentors. She agreed to look into doing that.
- Councilman Gilbert commented on the good that organizations like F2F will make upon individual lives and inquired of Chief Fletcher about the impact of when one "OG" is reformed.
- Councilwoman Berz inquired of Ms. Boozer about the plans for youth at risk of gang activity. She also asked Ms. Boozer if the Mayor's Council for Women (Justice Committee) could discuss policy with F2F; Ms. Boozer agreed.
- Chairman Freeman asked for a *point of personal privilege* and recognized Richard Bennett of the organization, A Better Tomorrow, which continues to work with at-risk youth.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS:

Economic and Community Development

Donna Williams, Administrator, gave a report from District 9 and updated the Council on one of the priorities that resulted from the District 9 Annual Summit: bringing a grocery store to the district. She informed the Council of the following:

- Market study done to bring a grocery store to the district
- Outreach to potential owners and operators

- The former Sunnytown Property condemned two (2) years ago
- Community members sending letters to Sunnytown owners
- Sunnytown property put up for sale
- Collaboration with Councilman Hakeem, Glass Farms Neighborhood Association, the Glass House Collective and various city departments/divisions: CFD, CPD, LDO, CDOT and Codes
- Efforts leading to a new grocery store coming to the Sunnytown site

Reggie Ruff, architect of the new store, discussed the site plans for the new Save-A-Lot store coming to the district. He indicated that construction will begin in December 2016. The store will open in March 2017. [Vice Chair Mitchell took over as chairman at this point in the meeting. Chairman Freeman stepped out momentarily.]

Councilman Hakeem thanked the neighborhood, Council, Administration and Ms. Williams for working together on this endeavor. Councilmen Gilbert, Smith and Grohn expressed thanks to Councilman Hakeem and congratulations to those involved.

Chief McIntyre spoke about CPD's efforts in increasing minorities and discussed the "Each One, Reach One" concept applied to recruiting at the department.

 The committee met today and discussed Transportation items with Blythe Bailey, Transportation Administrator. He noted that Mr. Holland was not at the meeting to discuss Public Works items. However, he informed Mr. Holland were no questions from the Council on the PW items.

Youth and Family Development Committee Councilman Gilbert (No report)

RECOGNITION OF PERSONS WISHING TO ADDRESS COUNCIL (Non-Agenda Items)

Attorney Hinton read the rules of procedure for persons wishing to address the Council on non-agenda items. After which, Vice Chair Mitchell recognized the following persons:

- Richard Bennett (A Better Tomorrow) He has worked over 20 years in Chattanooga
 with at-risk individuals and has provided modules to help deter violence. He hopes that the
 City will fund a consortium among groups already working against violence. He believes
 there is a disaster among children and that the City needs to find funds for heading off the
 disaster.
 - Councilman Hakeem recognized Monty Bruell of the Glass House Collective, who has been instrumental in his district.
 - Councilman Gilbert agreed with Mr. Bennett recommended looking at organizations that are working against violence.
- **Jerry Martin (McBrien Road)** He was a Public Works employee who was laid off due to failing a physical test that required him to lift 100 pounds.
 - Alonzo Strickland (SEIU Union Steward) He joined Mr. Martin at the podium to elaborate on the union's questions regarding the physical tests. He stated that the job description does not say that an individual must lift 100 pounds, and argues that there anything 100 pounds would require more than one person to lift.
 - Todd Dockery, Human Resources Administrator, responded to Councilman Gilbert's questions about consistency in the job descriptions. Chairman Freeman asked Mr. Dockery to report back to the Council on this.

- Mr. Strickland responded to Chairman Freeman's questions on reaching out to Public Works administrators or managers on behalf of Mr. Martin.
- Mr. Dockery also responded to Chairman Freeman's questions about what happens to an individual's pension once they are no longer employed with the City.
- Councilman Gilbert asked Mr. Dockery to look at weight factors being specific to certain jobs.
- Councilman Grohn recommended that the city's new risk assessment person should look into this matter.
- Mr. Dockery offered to meet with Mr. Martin after tonight's meeting to discuss this matter.
